Supposing [Jesus] to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." ¹⁶Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him in Hebrew "Rabbouni!" (which means Teacher). ¹⁷Jesus said to her, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.'" ¹⁸Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord"; and she told them that he had said these things to her. John 20:15b-18 NRSV

Dear Beloved Community of HRLC,

According to the resurrection account in John's gospel, Jesus appeared to Mary first as she stood there weeping outside of the empty tomb. The story is so rich with imagery and deep in the moving connections between Mary and her beloved teacher, Jesus. Each of the four gospels tell the story of the chaotic and confusing time immediately following the crucifixion of Jesus and the attempts by his followers to honor and tend to his body. I've been thinking about Jesus and wondering what it was like for him in those first moments in the tomb after God breathed new life into his lifeless body and he woke up in the darkness. Did he squint his eyes as the stone was rolled away from the entrance? What was it like for him as he took his first steps out of the tomb into the dawn of his newly resurrected life? Perhaps it was a mixture of relief, rejoicing and reflection all swirling together for him, adding in gratitude for the grace of it all, it must have been wondrous for Jesus. As he emerged from the tomb of death, he met various followers. In John, it's Mary and she only recognizes him after he calls her name, "Mary." In this connection and recognition, he sends her to tell the other disciples. She went and told them, 'I have seen the Lord!"

As we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus on Easter Sunday this year, I'm mindful that we have been journeying through a long Lenten-like wilderness over the past year with the pandemic, the derecho and all the added challenges that have come our way as a community of faith. The theme for our Lenten journey was, *Lessons from the Wilderness*. At our Council retreat on March 27th, we pondered the theme, *Out of the Wilderness*, and shared our reflections of what we learned over the last year and what some of the high points and low points were for each of us in our stories. I'm hopeful that, as we're able to gather more freely over the next months, we'll be able to have occasions and moments of sharing together to hear your stories and reflect on our past year together as we were mostly apart and distanced. We are all emerging from various tombs of isolation and, walking with Jesus, our resurrected savoir, it's a time for relief, rejoicing and reflection all swirling together.

Part of our emerging from the wilderness centers around the ways we can more safely be back together in person as the vaccination rates go up in Linn County. Please bear with us as we, on the Council and the Task Force, prayerfully look at the data (rate of transmission, rate of vaccinations and rate of hospitalizations in Linn County) and weigh the yearning as well as the worry about coming back together. We understand that various congregations are making a variety of decisions from completely opening with few restrictions to not planning on opening up until mid-summer when a majority of their members are vaccinated. We have attempted to travel a middle road balancing the needs of those who want to make sure they are safe coming back to in person worship and those who aren't able at this time to be on a vaccination schedule. For now, the Council guidance is for those who are fully vaccinated are able to come to in person worship and all who attend will need to wear their masks, maintain the recommended distance and hand washing practices. We realize that there may be special circumstances that need to be considered and that there is no perfect way to do this. Each day brings new information and guidance about what can and can't be done safely.

All this is to say; we are going to have happier Easter celebrations this year, whether we're able to be in person to celebrate or at home rejoicing that vaccinations and more freedoms are on the way! Alleluias and Hallelujahs resound as we give thanks to God for walking with us through the hills and valleys of our year. We look out from the tomb with Jesus and see light, new life and hope on the horizon. Thanks be to God!

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed – Alleluia! Pastor Jayne

Council Corner

Holy Redeemer's Council met on Thursday, March 11. (Meeting minutes were previously sent via email or postal mail.) The council also met for its Retreat on March 27 from 9:00 am to noon. Here are a few highlights regarding guidelines for returning to worship:

Return to Worship Guidelines: With thanks to the task force, Council has approved the following guidelines for returning to worship:

- 1. Fully vaccinated people (those two weeks from their final dose or single Johnson & Johnson dose) are welcome to return to inperson worship.
- 2. All must wear face coverings and maintain social distance while in the building.
- 3. Please let Admin Assistant, Jeff Hand (secretary@holyredeemer.church), or Pastor Jayne (pastor@holyredeemer.church) know if you would like to attend worship. Space is limited so this helps us plan to welcome you if we know prior to your arrival.
- 4. If you have a special circumstance or a question, please contact Pastor Jayne or Jeff during the week.

Worship services will continue to be streamed live on Facebook and copied to YouTube for later viewing.

The task force will continue to do its work and provide best practice recommendations. Council will continue to evaluate at their regularly scheduled meetings, the next of which is April 8, 2021 (via Zoom at 7:00 p.m.).

Finances: During the month of February, we were short of our total budgeted income goal by \$12,611. This included a general fund shortage of \$10,258 and a building fund shortage of \$2,353. Monthly budgeted general fund income for 2021 is \$15,591.

Editor's Note: Two weeks of February offerings were counted on Monday, March 1. This accounts for a significant portion of the shortfall.



National Child Abuse Prevention Month

According to the most recent Iowa Department of Human Services data, 9,532 Iowa children were subject to abuse or neglect. The



most common forms of abuse included denial of critical care, physical injury, exposure to illegal drugs or dangerous substance, and sexual abuse.

Lutheran Services in Iowa helps combat child abuse through prevention, safety, and stability services, as well as mental and behavioral health care.

Through regular in-home visits to families, LSI Early Childhood Services prevent child abuse by giving parents the support, education, and resources they need to build a healthy, stable home for their children. In 2020, our Early Childhood programs provided more than 18,000 in-home and virtual visits to families.

LSI Family Centered Services help children and families already involved in a crisis or abuse situation to become safer and more stable, and LSI's Bremwood and Beloit Residential Treatment Centers serve many children and youth who have experienced trauma from past abuse or neglect.

Empowering Iowa Families

Gaylene was overwhelmed raising three young boys. Finances were strained and she and her partner, José, worked hard to make ends meet. Suddenly, well into her second trimester, Gaylene learned she was pregnant with her daughter, Julieanna. Left with less time to prepare her home for a fourth child, Gaylene was stressed at the thought of welcoming a little girl into a house with three energetic older brothers. And once Julieanna was born, Gaylene began experiencing postpartum depression.

Gaylene enrolled in LSI Early Childhood Services for help, and she and José began meeting with their LSI worker, Kellie. She provided the family with age-appropriate ideas and developmental activities for the kids, and served as a shoulder to lean on whenever Gaylene or José needed guidance or advice. Gaylene recently graduated from college with a degree in early childhood education, and her family is thriving. Gaylene also graduated out of LSI services last year. The family still keeps in touch with Kellie, and Gaylene says she will forever be grateful for the support she received when times were difficult.

"We got so used to Kellie coming to our home for five years, it's going to be different. But now I know where to turn and how to help my family down the road," Gaylene says. "I feel like Kellie and LSI actually care about people and parents."
