On October 4, people all over the world will be celebrating St. Francis Day in honor of the Patron Saint of Animals, Saint Francis of Assisi. In remembrance of his love for all sentient beings, guardians sometimes take their animal companions to church for a Blessing of the Animals. This year at HRLC, weather permitting, you're invited to bring your pet(s) (or a photo of your pet) in your vehicle and come to the church

parking lot around 10:30 am for the Blessing of the Animals. Please come with your masks on and I will bless your beloved companions and then you can be on your way.

Later that day in the afternoon, the Confirmation students and their mentors will be embarking on an outdoor COVID-safe class on the CR scooters on the Cedar Valley Trail to explore God's creation and to learn more about caring for the earth as good stewards of the earth, air, water and the creatures that share the planet with us.

I invite you, as you're able wherever you may be that day, to join us in spending some time learning a little bit more about how you and your loved ones can participate in caring for our beautiful creation. The ELCA as its website, www.elca.org, has an abundance of resources for you.

In addition to the damage caused to farms, buildings, homes, businesses, landscaping and lawns, the wildlife and pets have been impacted as well. If you feel moved to do so, you might consider checking with the animal rescue sites and city, county and state parks to see if there are ways that you might help and support them in their recovery from the derecho storm.

Many of our members and friends of HRLC are in various stages of recovery following the storm. If we can assist you as the needs are identified, please know that there is no job too small for folks to lend a hand. If we can help in others ways, please let us know. We continue to partner with our friends at Gloria Dei Lutheran Church to assist our neighbors at the Edgewood Forest Mobile Home Park on Johnson Avenue. The need there is great and we've been able to make a difference as we help remove the mountains of tree debris in the park. HOLY REDEEMER REOPENING TASK FORCE REPORT

September 23, 2020

The Holy Redeemer Reopening Task Force met on September 22. During our meeting, we reviewed the Governor's most recent Proclamation of Disaster Emergency, guidance from federal, state, and local public health experts, and current relevant coronavirus data from the Linn County Department of Public Health. Unfortunately, a review of this information indicated a trend in coronavirus cases in Linn County which is not consistent with reopening HRLC to in person events, including worship at this time. In addition, today, the Task Force received information from Bishop Burk that due to the nature of the coronavirus, the high rate of infections throughout Iowa, the confluence of increasing infection risks, and the beginning of flu season, he is recommending against gathering in person, including returning to in person worship.

We continue to work on enhancing and updating our video and live streaming capabilities and thank Matt Hubbell for assisting us in those efforts. Due to the impact of the derecho storm, our efforts were delayed, but we are working to implement some changes and improvements in the next few weeks.

In the meantime, in order to continue to provide a meaningful worship experience in these very challenging times, the Task Force recommends continuing HRLC's virtual/online worship services and proposes a trial resumption of communion. HRLC has purchased wafer and juice communion sets so communion can be offered to the congregation for pick up at HRLC after virtual/online worship and delivered to the homes of individuals who are unable to come to HRLC to pick up communion. The Task Force proposes that a trial resumption of communion occur on Reformation Sunday, October 25 in order to provide ample time to plan for it and communicate the plan to the congregation so it can be done in an appropriate, meaningful, and safe manner. The Task Force will continue to monitor data from Linn County along with guidance from federal, state, and local public health experts and provide updates, as necessary.

We continue to thank all of HRLC's members for their patience and understanding and are grateful for all who continue to support and pray for our ministry together during this difficult and frustrating time. We appreciate your understanding and ongoing faithful commitment to the common good based on the best scientific evidence that is available.

Council Corner

Holy Redeemer's Council met on Thursday, September 10. (Meeting minutes were previously sent via email or postal mail, but a few highlights are listed here.)

Suspension: Please refer to the Task Force report (beginning on page 2) for details. Current information and trends are not consistent with safely reopening the church to in-person activities, including worship. Worship will continue to be streamed on Facebook Live on Sunday mornings. If you are unable to join the live stream, you can also watch the recorded version on either Facebook or YouTube later in the week.

The task force will continue to do its work and provide best practice recommendations. Council will continue to evaluate at their regularly scheduled meetings, the next of which is 8 October 2020 (also via Zoom at 7:00 p.m.).

Finances: During the month of August, we were short of our total budgeted income goal by \$4,121.

Council Minutes: Council minutes, including additional financial details, are sent via email or postal mail approximately one week after the council meetings. If you have any questions, please ask a council member or contact the office.

A Letter from Bishop Michael Burk

Dear Friends in Christ,

The transition is well underway. While I have had the privilege to spend several hours in fruitful conversation with Bishop-elect Amy Current, it was a delight to have her present and engaged with the newly constituted Southeastern Iowa Synod Council and again as the Fall Conference got underway. As I prepare to complete my term, I am filled with hope.

Some things to share:

- You should have received the invitation to the Installation of the Rev. Amy L. Current as bishop of the Southeastern Iowa synod. Even as you plan to join us online, please share the invitation with members of your congregation and other friends of this synod.
- Soon-to-be Bishop Current will begin her employment in the Office of the Bishop on October 15. While I will continue to serve through October 31, this period of overlap will benefit the process of transition.
- While decisions about when and where to gather for worship are necessarily local decisions, as colder weather eliminates the option of outdoor worship, I recommend against gathering in person. Some months ago, I was clear that those who were gathering in person should prepare for a return to being apart. Because of the nature of the COVID-19 virus, the high rate of infections throughout Iowa, and the confluence of increasing infection risks and

- the beginning of the flu season, in-person worship is NOT recommended. I am aware of the pressures to resume in-person activities at church. I know the arguments that proponents continue to make. But when it comes to matters of public health, Christians are guided by our commitment to love the neighbor. This may be disappointing, but it is not an unreasonable or unbearable hardship.
- For those who insist on being together which again, is NOT recommended the CDC guidelines regarding physical distance and face coverings should be required of all participants. If gathered indoors, it is appropriate to ask anyone who refuses to wear a face covering to leave, in the same way that anyone whose behavior or attendance presents a danger to others should be asked to leave. This is not meant to exclude. This is not political. This is a sign of faithful commitment to the common good, based on the best scientific evidence that is available.
- Singing when together remains one of the most dangerous activities with regard to community spread of the virus. It is hard to imagine a Reformation Day festival or worship during Advent and Christmas without singing together. Remember that one of the first examples of a "super spreader" event in this country was a church choir rehearsal in the state of Washington. The current infection rate in and around this synod is higher than the rate of infection in that location at the time. Choir rehearsals, even when preparing for an online offering, are a significant risk.
- We continue to pray for the people in and around communities that were impacted by the devastation of the derecho. As we work to identify more avenues for providing assistance to victims of the storm, we continue to distribute the generous donations as they come in, partnering with area agencies that have a good track record in helping the most vulnerable. You may still donate to the relief through the Southeastern Iowa Synod.

I know these are hard days. So many difficulties have converged, at times making it feel like we are being forced to sacrifice more than we should have to give up. I am humbled when my own impatience gives way to remembering the suffering of so many others who live lives on the margins and whose well being is persistently at risk.

We can do this. Out of deep love for the neighbor, we can be together from a distance for as long as it takes, trusting that by the power of God's own Spirit, we are knit together into the Body of Christ.

Judy had a call from Don Fields, the director of Take Away Hunger. He told her that groups are calling and begging for food. They have given away the supply they had on hand. Unfortunately, due to the pandemic, it's been hard for groups to package the meals. The need is there. We hope that next year we will be able to package meals for TAH.

4th Sunday Offering

In October, our designated fourth Sunday offering is scheduled for October 25. The proceeds from this offering will go to **Willis Dady Homeless Services**.

Willis Dady Homeless Services provides shelter and prevention services to local homeless and near-homeless, including veterans. This shelter provides case management and homeless prevention education with the mission of "building from shelter to stability."

Linn Community Food Bank

Following the derecho, most local food banks are in desperate need of donations as they continue to make meals available to storm victims in addition to those who are in regular need.

Our next Food Bank weekend (2nd Sunday of the month) is scheduled for October 11.

Group leaders: If you would like to include group off-site group activities on the church calendar or in the newsletter, please let Jeff know in the office.



A Path to Healing

When 14-year-old Bri first came to LSI's Beloit Residential Treatment Center in Ames, she was struggling with aggression, frequently ran away, and had a hard time focusing in school. And as she was trying to heal from years of trauma, Bri's beloved grandpa suddenly passed away. She felt stuck and nothing was getting better, no matter what she tried. But her Beloit team was there to cheer her on.

The LSI team at Beloit provides 24-7 mental health treatment for Iowa children who have often experienced years of trauma, abuse, or neglect. Staff members are there to encourage children on their path to hope and healing, and they were there to lift up Bri when she decided to make a positive change in her life. Bri began actively participating in individual and group therapy sessions provided at Beloit, and she made it a point to encourage her peers on campus every day. Her Beloit team helped her to feel more comfortable opening up about her grief, and staff members were there to remind her of all the progress she had made to help her stay focused on the positives.

After months of hard work, Bri found a loving foster family and was able to leave Beloit's programming. And while she felt uncertain and

anxious about leaving, she knew she was ready to move forward.

Bri continues to keep in touch with the team at Beloit, providing details on her new life, school, and her new room at home. Bri's anxiety about the unknown has diminished, she feels confident communicating her emotions, and she has hope for the future.


God's Work, Our Hands
